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CIVIL SEABORNE IMPORT REQUIREMENTS IN

TIME OF WAR

Note by the Secretary

- 1. At its meeting of 20th Documber 1951, the Financial and Boonomic Board approved the attached questionnaire and cover note.
- 2. Delegations are requested to send their replies to this questionnaire to the Secretariat within the specified time-limits.

- 1. The attention of the Delegations is drawn to the interim
 Report from the F.E.B. to the Council Deputies on problems raised
 in the Council of Deputies' resolution D-D(51)135(Final) on
 Civilian Seaborne Import Requirements in Time of War (FEB-D(51)44 Final)
 which was approved by the Council of Deputies at their meeting on the 10th
 of October.
- 2. It will be seen from paragraph 8a of this report that it was recommended as a starting point that all NATO Governments should be asked to supply "actual imports by volume for a reference year to be agreed (preferably the most recent 12 months period)".
- 3. The F.E.B. have now approved the attached questionnaire to be sent to all member Governments. The attention of the Delegations is specially drawn to the recommendations in paragraphs 3 and 4 of the Questionnaire that the figures for total imports of the selected semmedity groups for the calendar year 1950 should be supplied at an early date, if possible within one menth from the receipt of this document.
- As for the paragraph 8b requesting Governments to submit supplementary information and necessary explanations relating to 1952/53, it will be noticed that for this purpose it is assumed that certain sources of supply would be no longer available, i.e. according to hypothesis "A", countries behind the Iron curtain and areas within the Baltic. In this connection it would be helpful if Governments would supply at an early date, if possible within two menths, particulars of their imports in 1950 from the Eastern Block, Finland and Sweden both in total and for the selected commedity groups.
- 5. Turning to paragraph 8c, it seems clear that if the greatest value is to be obtained from this study, it will be necessary for similar information to be obtained for other countries not included in NATO. It has therefore been agreed to invite NATO Governments to cooperate in collating this information from published sources rather than to address the questionnaire to non-NATO Governments. Each NATO Government is invited to supply data for dependent everseas territories if any. Some NATO countries, including U.S.A. and U.K. have effered to help in obtaining data for other countries.

It is hoped that a special offert will be made to forward the summary data as at "A" in the questionnaire with the least possible delay.

QUESTIONNAIRE

ACTUAL INCORTS IN REFERENCE YEAR

- 1. Statistics are requested of the weight of morehandise imported (as recorded in, or estimated from National Trade Statistics),

 (A) for total imports for selected commedity groups and for all commedities distinguishing scaberne imports (Table I) and

 (B) for individual groups showing the sources of import by countries and areas (Tables 2 to 20)
- 2. In order to secure comparability between statistics of reporting countries, the selected commodity groups are defined by their code numbers in the Standard International Trade Classification (Ref. Statistical Papers, Series M.10, of the United Nationa Statistical Office).
- 3. Figures should relate in the first instance to the calendar year 1950.
- 4. It is asked that the total figures, referred to at "A" above, should be supplied at an early date, if possible within one menth, and that the detailed figures showing sources of imports, as at "B" above, should follow as seen as they can be completed.
- 5. Summary figures for 1951 as at "A" above, are also desired as soon as they can be supplied. Detailed figures, as at "B", will probably be requested later.
- 6. The countries and areas to be shown as sources of imports, are defined in Annex A. Subdivisions of the defined areas may be made when they would appear to facilitate the segregation at a later stage of goods carried in short sea trades.
- 7. Reporting countries are invited to draw attention to any case where imports of a selected commodity were abnormal in the period covered.
- S, Statistics should relate to imports by all modes of transport (sea, land, river, canal, air etc.); an additional column is provided in which reporting countries are asked to add figures of seaborns imports in total and separately for those commodities for which such imports were appreciable. Seaborne imports include all imported commodities (except goods in transit) which have been conveyed, at least in part, by a sea going vessel(1)

⁽¹⁾ A vessel is said to be see-going if part at least of his veyage while carrying the goods in question is by sea (Definition of Statistical Office of the United Nations - Monthly Bulletin of Statistics -1950 Supplement).

- 9. All direct transit and transhipment trade should be excluded. Where the imports figures given in reply to this questions include for any of the selected commodities substantial quantities which have been imported for subsequent re-export, countries are asked to state the weight of the commodity re-exported in the reference year.
- 10. Ships delivered afloat and aircraft delivered by air, should be excluded from the statistics. The following items should also, if possible, be excluded in accordance with the usual procedure in furnishing statistics for international purposes:
 - (a) Bunker fuel, ballast and ships stores.
 - (b) Catch when carried in original fishing vessel.
 - (c) Bullion and specie.
 - (d) Passongers' baggago.
 - (e) Mail.
- 11. The weight given should be so far as possible net of cuter packaging, i.e. as normally recorded by countries in their trade statistics.
- 12. In cases where non weight measures are converted into metric tons, the conversion factors should be stated.
